Anniversary Celebrations:

Four and a half years ago a group of interested men met to look at setting up a Men's Shed. Alan Greenhalgh was the catalyst who believed so much in the value of such an organization that he didn't let up. The group involved in starting a Men's Shed included Barry Fitzsimons, Stan Elson, David Ammon, Ken Shukla, Sammy Ang, George Mullen, Bill Shortman, Barry Howell, Jim Lyle and Malcolm Burton. Over the next 6 months Arthur Yates, Bob Davis, Jem Shorland, Kevin Rickson, Tony Brewer and Rob Hansen joined the group.

In the beginning without any venue to call home social events were organized as a way of building interest. Finding a home and setting up the structure of a Men's Shed was of paramount importance. This involved a huge amount of work. We must thank Alan Greenhalgh and his working group for setting us up so well. Pauline Sookloll from City Of Joondalup was a great help in this process. Pauline is still helping us wherever she can.

Many options were looked at as a potential site for a Men's Shed. None were possible without us proving ourselves as a viable organization. (Long term the City of Joondalup say they will include us in the redevelopment of the Heathridge site which was one of our early options.)

In December 2010 we were extremely fortunate to be able to move into the Padbury High School Manual Arts area. This was eventually leased to the Shed. This gave us a home and also a lot of equipment. We hope to be able to stay here. We have another year to run on our lease. Our involvement with the Special Services Group of the Education Department has proven to be very valuable for us both.

The Men's Shed was incorporated in January 2011. Our first Annual General Meeting was held in 2011. Many of the working group were elected to positions on the Committee. Some are still there today.

Our Shed has grown to where we have 228 members on our data base, 125 are currently financial.

We have turned out an amazing range of products, learnt many new skills, run computer classes, been involved in Sausage Sizzles, assembly of wheel barrows, barbecues and outdoor furniture and with the proceeds banked a large sum of money for our future development. Our Bench Press is keenly read.

Because of our age bracket we have had to sadly farewell some of our members. I know that they were happy to be involved with the shed and such a group of caring members. We are here to provide that friendship to all our members. Just ask Ralph how he feels about the Shed

Thank you to all those members who have gone the extra mile to be involved in the running of the shed. It is not always the easiest job but has to be done to keep our shed operating.

We are all volunteers, we do the best we can to be involved. Thank you to all our members for being part of our Joondalup Men's Shed.


Eulogy for Sam Alford: Tony Brewer


Sam on those odd occasion talked about his family and judging by his comments he was a true family man and a dedicated husband.








PROJECT: DOLLS HOUSE
