I was able to spend Christmas with our oldest daughter in New Zealand. The family had planned to ride some sections of the Alps to Ocean bike trail. Took a bit of organising to get accommodation over the Christmas break. We visited Mt Cook on the first day. Spectacular to see the tops of the mountains covered in snow. Mt Cook is a very popular tourist attraction, surrounded by mountains. The unusual hot weather was causing breaking up of some of the ice patches that were still hanging onto the sides of mountains.

Our ride started from Jolly carpark on the Northern side of Lake Pukaki. This ride was mainly on shingle roads through some of the highest Stations in the area. We went past the Tekapo Power station to Twyzel where we stayed for two nights.

Next section of the trail was beside the Ohau to Pukaki canal. Interesting to see the canals which move water to the power Stations are also being used for Salmon Farming. We then wound our way on a narrow trail to Ohau Lodge. This lodge has been mainly used for Skiing accommodation in winter but with the popularity of the bike trails is open year round. Great to see people of all ages riding the trails. The New Zealand Government have developed these trails to encourage more tourists.

The next day included riding to the top of a 900m peak. Narrow rough trails zigzagging to the summit and then a 6 km fast ride down the hill to Omarama.

Last day was to ride the section from Kurow (rain shadow area only getting about 350 mm of rain a year) to Duntroon and then to Omaru on the coast. This was the greenest and most picturesque section of the trail. This trail went through or on the edge of a lot of farms and was very interesting. Lots of crops still green. Unusual rock outcrops "Elephant rocks" with interesting walks and fossils to be found. This was the hilliest section of the trail.


We came home via Melbourne to catch up with our son and his family.


Cooking Classes.
