The President's Report

This year has been all go. The most important issue has been to secure a place for the Men's Shed when our lease with the Education runs out at the end of 2016.

At a meeting arranged by our Patron lan Goodenough, with lan chairing, we met with Michelle Hoad and Brett Dorney



from WA Institute and Neil Butler from Edith Curtin University. Both groups expressed strong support for the Men's Shed. A couple of options came up that at least gave us something to think about and work on. The first option was to pursue an extension of our lease with the Education Department. If that wasn't successful we should approach ECU to see whether we could be part of the MTA site now in ECU hands.

Also it might be possible to talk to WA Institute to look at the possibility of land being available at their Joondalup site. Not promising, but worth chasing up if we were stuck.

We began by working behind the scenes to find out the best approach and the best people to contact. We were lucky to have a member who was able to approach the Director General of Education who visited the shed. Sharyn O'Neil with Martin Cleary were very impressed with what we do and as they left said that they would give us another year in our present site. This is great news but still means we have to find somewhere to live after the end of 2017.

On 5th April we met with City of Joondalup Mayor Troy Pickard and Dale Page Director of Planning and Development. The Mayor will look into some options for us. He fully supports us and said that we need to encourage all Councillors to visit the Shed and appreciate the value of our organisation to the community.

We will keep you informed of any further developments.

On 12th April Michael Robinson, Bernie Egan and I met with the group of Men's Sheds north of the river. This was very helpful for us and the members from the other shed's. We've offered to host the next get together in September.

It was great to see the work of Wheelchairs for Kids, as this was the venue for the meeting. They have sent away over 33000 wheelchairs over the last 18 years. We'll organise a visit, as I'm sure that you will find it very interesting.

Our membership now stands at over 210.

Thanks to those members who helped at the 3 Triathlons, the Lions Fair, the Poynter Market, and assembling wheelbarrows at Masters. Many members help with shed projects. I appreciate the effort that you put into the shed and the product you turn out that has helped us to now have close to \$90 000 banked for a rainy day.

I would like this month to especially thank Frank Antulov and Bill Feathem. They seem to always be in the shed and working on shed projects in their quite efficient way. Their efforts don't go unnoticed.



Police Heademy Outing

Monday the 18th of May was set aside for a visit to the W A Police academy. This facility encourages tours to make the public aware of the learning environment that the academy provides to those who aspire to a career in the Police force. Australia Police Academy is located in the northern suburb of Joondalup. It is an independent part of the Joondalup Learning Precinct and partnering with the West Coast Institute of Training and the Edith Cowan University to develop academic courses that enhance the qualifications that incumbent police trainees will obtain through the established programs.

The members, who attended the escorted tour of the facility, were briefed on the academy's state-ofthe-art training facilities which ensure a learning experience in a real environment. The tour included a visit to the establishment's facilities that included

- Lecture theatres
- Weapons training and simulation facilities (briefing on the weapon firing simulation and hand to hand combat)
- A mock up town setup (training in real time with actors role playing on scenario requirement)
- Gymnasium for physical fitness
- A cafeteria that catered to those who attended the academy and visitors. A vast menu to choose from to satisfy the culinary orders

Bunnings Sausage sizzle

Bunnings Joondalup has requested the JMS to assist in their effort to provide Tradies with early morning breakfast, on Fridays. The shed has assisted on a few occasions, with all ingredients being provided by Bunnings. The final plans to run this exercise, regularly, are a foot. They were staunch to the end against odds uncounted,


They fell with their faces to the foe.


