

# Joondalup Mens Shed Bench Press May 2020

The effect of the pandemic has restricted our shed's activities and the period of

uncertainty curbs our enthusiasm towards a final resolution of the effective social distancing and "lock down".

Our shed manager, Graham, has been very busy with his dedicated team to clean up the shed. Two days a week the team has been diligently cleaning the loft area and the workshop area. Our gratitude to their efforts and, hopefully, when we open in not too distant a future the membership can show their appreciation and continue to maintain the cleanliness that they have managed to accomplish. The membership has been informed of the proposed increase in the membership subscription. The subscription is based on a recommended fee structure with the additive of the daily door fees that the members deposited, towards the consumables in the shed. There was always some argument on this payment in the past, where "some" members thought that they were not obliged to pay for the consumables and sometimes substituting washers and foreign coins. We can demonstrate, through our accounts, the deficit that the shed experienced in this collection. So as to remove the responsibility, the inclusion of this amount was based on each member attending once a week for the effective 50 weeks. There is some discussion that this would subsidize the attendance of members who come more than once a week. But for members there is no restriction on the number of days of attendance. In fact, the shed would be more than happy to see increased attendance and thereby the social interaction.

The Committee would be more than happy to submit a financial statement to full justify this subscription.

We have received various enquiries as to why we were not opening the shed during this period allowing for a gathering of 20 people as the phase 2 of the Covad-19 safety plan allows. As explained in the email to members, the logistics of various health and safety requirement, as mentioned in the Covad-19 health departments Safety Guidelines – Sport and Recreation, Phase 2, Version 1.0 18 May 2020, it was near impossible to pick and choose only those rules that would help in our decision to accommodate our members will to open. The package required ALL recommendations to be followed. The committee had examined each clause and came to a unanimous decision that it would be premature to open without compromising the health and safety of ALL our members. We request members to scrutinize the document.

I thank all committee members for their diligence and contributions towards the contents of our meetings, through emails, and the decisions that we were collectively able to achieve. Thanks to all those members who responded to our general membership advisories and we welcome all comments to enable us to be accountable for our decisions.

We hope for better, safer and healthier days ahead. We look forward to welcoming you all back to the shed in the very near future.

#### Annual Membership Fees

With the relaxing of restrictions last week the committee was able to meet for the first time since February.

One of the matters discussed was membership fees.

You may know that in January we received a petition from some members asking that membership fees be increased to deal with shortages in funds and increased costs to run the shed when we move into Winton Road.

Consequently the committee looked at our current situation and found that we do need to increase fees. The increase in fees is also important because we have had no income during the closure of the shed. Also there will be no Lotterywest grant money until after 2021.

Proposed membership increase \$100

Proposed recovery of the consumable costs based on 200 members of \$10,000 would be \$50 per head.

That would mean \$150 without the headache of policing the voluntary collection from members who take the voluntary to mean literally voluntary.

#### **Current Rules approved by the Commissioner**

Division 2 — Membership fees

#### 12. Membership fees

- (1) The committee must determine the entrance fee (if any) and the annual membership fee (if any) to be paid for membership of the Association.
- (2) The fees determined under sub rule (1) may be different for different classes of membership.
- (3) A member must pay the annual membership fee to the treasurer, or another person authorised by the committee to accept payments, by the date (the **due date**) determined by the committee.
- (4) If a member has not paid the annual membership fee within the period of 3 months after the due date, the member ceases to be a member on the expiry of that period.

In line with our Constitution membership fees are due to be paid in advance by 1 July. However the committee decided that the new membership fee may paid in two half yearly installments.

As we do not know when we will open again it could be difficult to pay in person so there is the option to pay by direct bank transfer.

Please be aware that the committee is always working in the best interests of all members.


