DON'T LET THIS HAPPEN





This is the drum sander, looks pretty doesn't it. Well it should not look like this. The cause of this is because too much pressure is applied when sanding resulting in burning the sanding paper and rendering it useless.

The cost to replace the sanding sheets is over \$20. When using the sander only apply minimum pressure. Wind the handle up until the drum makes light contact with the timber, then let the timber travel through then give the handle only about one eighth turn each time. It has been decided that any member who damages the sanding sheets will be required to pay for a replacement sheet. Also in the interest of saving shed funds if the sheets are damaged they will only be replaced at the end of the month. So please consider other members And be considerate when operating this machine.

This is the story of his life.

Part fourteen (Final)

The bus stopped at the Palace of Festivals and Congresses building that does the Cannes Film Festival every year. I gave my movie camera to a guest and told her to photograph Dorothy and me going up the steps however there was no red carpet. The number of famous film stars who had done that over the years is countless. Another famous Hitchcock movie was made here called "To Catch a Thief" with Grace Kelly and Cary Grant. We followed the same road with all the bends and hills as in the movie until we got to Monaco.. We stopped at the gates to the palace of Prince Rainier of Monaco but they were closed and there was no flag flying. We continued along the road to Monte Carlo. The views were magnificent. We set off back to the ship as it was nearing dinner time. The next day we sailed to Alghero on the east coast of Sardinia. We spent half a day looking round. You could get a donkey ride up the hill if you wanted but we declined. The ship was leaving early so all had to be on board by 5pm. We had dinner in the restaurant and went to see a show after that. The ship now headed west to Gibraltar and there were no further stops. We walked through the streets of Gibraltar until we came to the British Embassy. Two soldiers in hot weather uniform were standing guard with rifles at their side at the entrance. We were allowed in as it was part museum as well. I got talking to one of the people on the gift stall and she told me there was a cemetery behind the building with grave stones of British sailors killed at the Battle of Trafalgar in October 1805. So I left Dorothy shopping and I went to checkout the cemetery. Sure enough the graves were there. These guys had fought and died with Lord Nelson at the most famous naval battle in British history.. What a place!!! After Gibraltar our next stop was Southampton. We got the train to London Kings Cross and from there we got a tube to east London as a nephew of mine called Gerard (my sister Maria's son) asked us to stay with him for a few days. He was a lecturer in fine arts at a private Art college in London. It was the week end so he took us to the various art galleries in London and other places of interest. It was. fantastic. Gerard was a mate of Alan Bates the actor and he helped him with some artistic projects. Maria told me when she visited Gerard in London Alan used to book a table at the Ritz for afternoon tea. When they went into the dining room all the heads would look up to see the famous actor and which lady he was with. So she felt like a bit of a star. I just missed meeting him as he was coming to Gerard's for dinner the following night. but all our travelling tickets and flight back to Australia had been arranged. The Ritz was also one of Princess Margaret's eateries. (Also Mo Salha Liverpool's centre forward goes there quite often these days)

When we returned to Gateshead we caught up with friends and relations again and went to local areas sight seeing. We visited Alnmouth a lovely village on the beach about 50 kl north of Newcastle. It has the oldest 9 hole. golf club in the world. When we lived in the UK we had many a holiday there with friends of the family. Richard Burton and Elizabeth Taylor had watering holes there in some of the Pubs. He made a famous film near there called Becket at Bamburgh Castle and also Alnwick Castle. Peter O Tool was also in that movie. It was then time to get back to Australia and home.

About 3 weeks after we got home I received in the post an A3 size envelope and on the back the address was from someone from Kentucky USA. I didn't know anybody living there so I gently prised it open and inside were cardboard protectors and inside them was a coloured photo of Doris Day. She was cuddling up to a white dog and at the right hand side was her writing and it said "To John with love from Doris". What a great surprise. She would have been about 50yr old when the picture was taken but still beautiful. The writing wasn't made by a rubber stamp as the lettering was still shining.

I rang my Agent when I got back as I wasn't fussy on going back to The Water Corp. He advised me that Flour one of the biggest Construction Companies in the world were looking for some one and I had been recommended to them. They were finishing a large mining project north of the goldfields and it was coming in way over budget and they wanted to find out why. So I started working for them from an office in West Perth.

I worked for them for about 2 year on other projects as well. The work included briefing solicitors and Queens Council in the detail for the response to the Statement of Claim and preparing support material and delayed cost summaries for inclusion in the defense. It was now 2002 and regarding the family young Dorothy had a house in Duncraig and had her own ball room dancing company and also did keep fit classes as well. Judith was married and teaching and lived in a house they bought in Bassendean. Simon had bought a unit in Maylands and had left Nifty and was working for a contractor as a supervisor doing work for the Main Roads Dept.

We decided to move from Green mount as we were always being asked to baby sit for young Dorothy. which was a good drive there and back We saw this Bed and Breakfast for sale in Warwick. So we sold the house in Green mount and bought the B and B. It had 4 letting rooms. 3 Doubles and one single .room The private accommodation was at the rear and upstairs. Dorothy loved it as soon as she seen it. The business specialized in getting guests from Britain that wanted to emigrate to Australia. The B and B had an arrangement with a newspaper in Queensland that if we sent to them a copy's of the Saturdays West Australian; they would give us advertising space in their Newspaper which was given out at immigration offices throughout Britain. It was a good deal for us and I got on well with the editor. I wrote the article and there were pictures of the B and B and all the rooms and swimming pool. We also did evening meals for selected guests only. I bought a Ford Fairmont and obtained a CV license which allowed me to pick up Guests at the airport and take them for drives. They paid extra for this of course. My Agent kept ringing but I needed a few month off engineering to make sure the B an B was going well. The customers loved Dorothy and we had no trouble with any of them. After about 4 month I was contacted by a company called MPDJV directly through them because of my contacts with Flour. They wanted a Senior Contracts Engineer. They were a joint venture between Sinclair Knight and Flour. SK did the design and procurement and Flour did the construction installation and commissioning. The group were the main contractor for BHP doing expansions for BHP iron ore mines and new mines as well in the Pilbara. I was about 57yr old by

MPDJV had good systems for tenders and contract awards similar to Western Mining and and my duties were very similar. I went to the Pilbara to have meetings with various contractors.. The main office was on St Georges Tce. I worked for them for about 6 years. I then worked for Promet and Thiess. My career ended when working with RCR as a staff man. They didn't like contractors doing engineering work for them. I was 72 yr old by then and had had enough so I retired. During the past 20 years Dorothy and ne had done some great trips away. The one that stands out was sailing down the River Nile from Cairo and the pyramids to Aswan

Family wise Dorothy had the B and B for 6 year but had to sell the business due to having 2 knee replacements and a hip replacement. So we bought a house in Edgewater. Its too big for us but that, was all that was available at the time. However we love the place. Its in a quite area and we are very near the family all the facilities we need. young Dorothy is running her own dancing classes and teaching keep fit classes. Judith is having a new house built in Bassendean on her old block and also reaches full time. She has 2 teenage daughters .Simon lives in Mt Lawley still and working as supervisor for a contractor supplying and installing the crash barriers on the freeway turnoffs. We now have 4gran daughters and 3 great gran children 2 boys and one girl

I joined the Men Shed about 10 years ago when Alan Greenhalgh was running it. This was when it was in the Padbury school. He did all of the paper work side of things. He and I used to use the Shed bus to go to ladies in distress to fix up their door problems in their homes. Some of them had drug addicts in the family and they were smashing in the doors to get to where they could find money and stuff they could flog.. One lady was so scared she had large bolts on the inside of her bedroom door.. The druggies were actually her grandsons. I also used to repair the damaged desks at the invalid store run by Jamie the controller from the Padbury school store. I did this work in the area that the Shed called the garage where guys could repair their cars. I did approx. 40 desks. This kept us in good with the school management as a new desk used to cost \$750. Frank Antulov, Chris Sinney, Rob Hanson and Graham Duffy all assisted me with this project
