As most of you would be aware the shed is embarking on a fishing trip Thursday 28th Sept on a large boat being provided by the Hillary's Yacht



The monthly Bunnings workshop last month was terracotta bee baths and cake stands, this month making little tables for our stall display.


The Resin workshop was a buzz of activity with some really great outcomes. Some of the men have been asking about it. Maybe a consideration for a joint event in future.

MEMBER UPDATE The voice of Men's Sheds

Dear Shedders,

This year we celebrate 30 years of Shedding, with lots of celebration during Men's Shed Week. The week started with a great event at Parliament House hosted by our bipartisan Friends of Men's Sheds group. This year we witnessed more members of both houses in attendance than ever before. I believe this is due to the fact that every Member of Parliament now has more than one Men's Shed within their electorate! This is a stark contrast to when AMSA began 16 years ago, when there was only a few dozen Men's Sheds is existence. This alone is testimony to where we have come and what we have achieved.

When Professor Barry Golding first mentioned to me that he was going to research and write about the history of Men's Sheds, including defining who and where the first Shed started, my first comment to Barry was, 'please don't. All it will do is start an argument'. History is important to acknowledge and it was our honour to celebrate 30 years of our movement in Goolwa during Men's Shed Week. I do want to acknowledge that there have been groups before us, though not under the name of a "Men's Shed", achieving the same or similar goals. In reality, it's important to acknowledge the history of our movement but it's not a critical element. There is no race. What is important is what we have achieved collectively in improving the health and wellbeing of men.

There is more detail on the 'Tour de Shed' road trip celebrating Men's Shed Week within this bulletin, but for me personally the highlight was not just being on the road with colleagues and friends for a week (with plenty of banter and a few beverages of an evening). The true highlight was visiting Sheds, particularly those in some of the smaller towns such as Kaniva, Nhill, and Bordertown (where they had a very welcome and warm fireplace). I was especially taken by Tintinara Community Men's Shed, where they displayed the true contribution that a Men's Shed makes in a small community with very little facilities in the prevention of social isolation.

At the end of the day Men's Sheds are all about men looking after men in a safe, friendly and happy male-friendly environment.

Men's Sheds and AMSA are now recognised as a major player in the men's health sector in Australia. As we have done in years gone by, this year we have again been involved in cross-sector and government discussions to improve health and wellbeing outcomes for Australian men. We believe there's growing momentum from the sector, as well as government, in achieving some real progress in supporting men and boys to live longer and happier lives, for the benefit of everyone.

Although we have come a long way since the introduction of the 2010 National Male Health Policy, and even more so since the launch of the National Men's Health Strategy 2020-2030, there is still a long way to go. Men still have a shorter life expectancy than women, and alarmingly still equate to over 75% of suicides in Australia. The gaps in both men's and women's health outcomes can be reduced with the right policies, programs and adequate funding.

In the coming weeks AMSA will be writing to seek your support as a collective voice in our appeal for a greater federal investment in men's health and wellbeing through AMSA and Men's Sheds. In Australia, there are more Men's Sheds than store locations of well-known commercial companies including Woolworths and Coles supermarkets, and Together we can and will make a difference by leveraging our platform, and we believe now is the time.

Items of interest from discussions at the last committee meeting

Only Shed Approved Rubbish in the Rubbish Bin

It has been observed that members are placing items sourced from outside of the premises in shed's general rubbish skip (red topped near the buses). This skip costs us \$95.00 each time we empty it. The last cycle only lasted a week. This is a large draw on our funds. Items such as bags of household rubbish, beer cartons, and a toilet bowl, lawn clippings, and various other have been placed in there of recent. If it has not come from the shed, please do not place rubbish in here.

Several members have been trying to reduce the amount of rubbish going into this bin by recycling cardboard and taking bags home for their own bins. Due to these efforts, it looks like we may get a month before needing to call the truck in. Thanks go to Greg for taking a Ute load of cardboard to Tamala recycling.

The cost of this skip could be greatly reduced if members would (a) not bring their general rubbish or no useable items in, and (b) could take bagged rubbish or cardboard home from the shed if their domestic bins are not full.

Shed Project Area - Not A Social Place

Some members are using the workshops for socialising. These areas are used by members concentrating on their own or sheds' projects. They can't be expected to monitor outside their immediate work area and people socialising in the workshop create crowded conditions which pose a risk to themselves and those engaged in activity in the workshops.

Shed Parking Reminder

Parking at the front of the shed is for vehicles with an Acrod label, vehicles being worked on, and dropping off or picking up items. It is not for general parking. It has recently become quite congested and as it is also a pedestrian thoroughfare - creates additional hazards. Please don't park in the front because just because space appears available.

Also, there is overflow parking at the City of Joondalup parking next to the State Swim Centre.

This picture is of the small drum sander, pretty isn't it. The problem is that it is rendered useless because too much pressure has been applied and also painted, varnished and wet timber has been put through it. This problem is happening on a regular basis and it costs a lot of money to replace the sanding sheets. Please use the grey matter before using the machine. If you have any timber of the above mentioned, put it through the thicknesser to remove all paint or varnish. The same applies to the larger drum sander

Time and again users of the machinery have been told to clean up after finishing the job. Last Tuesday this circular sander was used and left with thick dust not only on that machine but the one next to it and all over the floor,
