During the December meeting we covered:

- 1. Bunnings has agreed to the dates we requested for 2024 sausage sizzles.
- 2. While the city's part of the Metal Workshop waterproofing is done we still plan additional work on the gate to help with rain intrusion.
- 3. A new draft of the SOP has been completed and will be shared with members in January for review.
- 4. An update of the 5 year plan will be shared with members in January.
- 4. The Christmas function was a success with 54 members attending. Thanks to Graham for pushing to make this happen and doing the bulk of the work.
- 5. We are looking to support John Eaton in putting up a new JMS sign made of saws on the front fence. We need old saw donations please!
- 6. Finance we purchased a new accounting system Xero. We have also engaged an accountant to review the 2023 statements. Additionally the asset update was completed Whew! Thanks to Steve Brooks our asset manager for doing the heavy lifting.
- 7. Micro Dust Extraction We are going to add a project to the 5 year plan to add micro dust extraction in the Wood workshop.
- 8. Little Phil We are using Little Phil to get grant money for the Truck restoration. As a reminder, general shed revenue and donations ARE NOT used for the truck project. Members/ Donations must specify Truck donation when submitted.
- 9. Brian Hill and Chris Drury met with City Leadership during a luncheon to develop relationships with council members and the CEO in preparation for gaining support for the 5 year plan.
- 10. Net profit for November was \$5752.92
- 11. Guitar Donations we had a donation of guitar bodies and necks (they need lots of work)... if a member is interested in restoring one of these contact Rick (Colin is the lead on the restoration project).
- 12. Membership We had 130 general members and 24 associates as of December 9th.
- 13. Markets We made \$747 revenue in November, down from last year as market attendance is down dramatically this year. We are looking at expanding to Hillarys and North Shore Markets next year. Welcome to Mike Lockhead the new Sales and Marketing Manager.
- 14. As we close the year a special thanks to Graham, Geoff, Bill, and the shed supervision team for all they do for the shed. Thank you!

First, I wanted to thank all the Market producers and sellers for their GREAT support in 2023. We raised over \$10,000 for Shed Operations. Thank you!!!!

Second, again welcome Mike Lockhead your new Shed Sales and Market Manager for 2024.

Third, We have one market scheduled for January, and could use help doing a restock. The items we are short of or need repaired are: children's tool boxes, repair of children's picnic tables, summer wine tables, children's push carts, children's ironing boards and laundry racks, and smaller cheese boards. 


KINGSWAY MARKETS Saturday 13th January Saturday 3rd February

I am delighted to announce that Lisa Cook is now our second supervisor in the Tool Shed. Her knowledge and her calm approach is appreciated by us all.


